/Focus	"21st Century Schools" programme is inspired by the understanding that the
/Scope of work	education should be at the forefront of economic growth in the Western Balkans.
/Specification	Future labour market will assume new jobs, which will require new set of skills in
	employees, such as analytical thinking and innovation, critical thinking, complex
	problem-solving, etc. Many young people in Western Balkans leave formal

education without the skills required by employers. In some sectors, including digital, vacancies are left unfilled. At the same time, changes in technology are moving faster, and teachers are struggling to use technology effectively to support pupils' learning needs. Schools also lack the digital infrastructure to support the increased use of new technologies in education and need affordable solutions. Teaching coding through physical computing, using micro:bit devices, is an affordable way to support development of those skills in pupils.

Designed and piloted by the British Council and funded by the UK government, this ambitious education programme will be implemented over the three year period in all Western Balkan countries. It builds upon experiences gained under previous pilot project "21st Century Schools" initiated in 2017. Programme focuses on introducing core skills critical thinking, problem solving and coding in teaching and learning process in primary schools in Western Balkan countries, i.e. Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Macedonia, Serbia, Montenegro and Kosovo.

The new "21st Century Schools" programme brings activities piloted under the previous project to a much larger scale. It is expected that 27,330 trained teachers and up to 4,500 school principals will equip up to one million young people with practical coding, critical thinking and problem-solving skills, and support development of an enabling environment for closing the digital skills gaps in Western Balkan countries. By engaging all 10 to 15-year olds in the primary school system across the Western Balkans, programme supports development of competitive skills for future job market entry.

The focus of the assignment is:

Trough pilot period, one number of teachers and principals from primary schools in the Western Balkan countries are already trained in integrating problemsolving, critical thinking and coding skills in teaching and learning process.

Due to expansion of the project, The British Council is seeking trainers from each Western Balkans country to deliver trainings to primary school teachers on how to integrate critical thinking and problem solving in teaching and learning process, as per <u>British Councils original critical thinking and problem solving programme</u>.

Scope of work:

Validation process (provided by the British Council)

The selected candidates will be entitled to conduct training on critical thinking and problem-solving after they:

- complete the tasks prior to training of trainers (*August 2019*)
- participate at the three-day training of trainers workshop (September 2019)
- prepare and deliver a teaching session as a part of training of trainers workshop.

Delivery of trainings to local teachers

- preparation and delivery of trainings in amount of 15 to 20 days per school semester on critical thinking and problem-solving skills to the group of approximately 25 teachers, in coordination with the British Council (second cycle training will be delivered from September to October 2019)
- monitor, support and mentor teachers to integrate critical thinking and problem-solving in subject curricular, extracurricular and cross curricular activities (*November and December 2019*).

Outputs

- training to teachers delivered in coordination with the British Council
- two monitoring visits to provide mentorship and direct support to the teachers
- reports submitted to the British Council.

Evaluation Criteria

The award criterion for this Invitation to Quote is relevant experience.

Applicants will be assessed using the following criteria and weightings:

Mandatory and Discretionary Rejection	Pass/Fail
Section 1 - Background, knowledge and experience	60%
Section 2 - Understanding of BC aims/objectives	10%
Section 3 – Costing/Price	30%

Evaluation of all submitted responses will be undertaken by the evaluation panel which will consist of British Council representatives with relevant and significant experience and knowledge of the requirements.

Evaluation of all submissions will only consider information presented within the response. Previous/current relationships with suppliers cannot be taken into account when evaluating submissions unless the previous/current experience is clearly evidenced within the response. Evaluation will be fair and transparent.

The responses under each section will be scored based on the following matrix:

Points	Interpretation
15	Comprehensive and strong answer indicating the supplier is fully capable and experienced to deliver the required outcomes. Detailed response that directly responds to all requirements with no ambiguity and relevant examples provided.
12	There are slight concerns that the supplier will not be able to achieve all the outcomes required and response lacked details of relevant experience. A less detailed response that broadly responds to the requirement with some ambiguity and few relevant examples provided.
10	There are concerns that the supplier will not be able to achieve the outcomes required and response significantly lacks details of relevant experience. A less detailed response that broadly responds to the requirement with some ambiguity and no/irrelevant examples provided.
5	There are serious indications that the supplier will not be able to achieve the outcomes required and has not provided appropriate evidence of experience to successfully deliver the outcomes required. A response that is not entirely relevant to the requirement, with ambiguity and lacking specific detail.
0	The answer is non-compliant and/or no relevant information has been received to demonstrate the supplier can achieve the required outcomes. No response or a response that is entirely irrelevant.

	The final evaluation score will then be calculated for each response by adding together the scores for each Section.
